Call to Arms

We have successfully formed our own unit the 3rd Mississippi Infantry Company F, Shieldsboro Rifles for Memorial Services and Reenactments here locally. This is an idea we have had for sometime now and other members are showing interest. We want to be able to field our own unit to participate in events to honor our ancestors, as well as the namesake for our Camp. We will welcome others to fall in with us to form a good, diverse Confederate Company. The impression will be coastal defense which will allow for a mixture of branches ranging from dismounted cavalry to artillery. The main drill will be Hardee's Tactics which will mainly put us as infantry. But, my experience will allow us to have flexibilty for the impression we want to use for that event. We want to be able to outfit the unit with uniforms, camp all weekend if need be, and enjoy the comradery that has brought us all together. Between Beau, myself and some others who will join us along the way, we can supply uniforms and gear to get started. If you do not have any gear, or have partial gear, come anyway and we will finish supplying you with the necessary items. If we can not complete your uniform, we will borrow from others at the event. This unit will be based out of Beauvoir and will form there for drill each month as a part of the 3rd Saturday Living Histories to support the crown jewel of the Coast. We completed our first drill at the Third Saturday Living History at Beauvoir Saturday February 18, 2017 with success. We have formed up at Confederate Flag Day on March 4, 2017, set up a Living History March 18, 2017 both at Beauvoir, and formed up at Gautier Cemetery for the Live Oak Rifles Memorial on Saturday April 15, 2017. The unit had a very successful weekend at Beauvoir with a gathering the Friday night of Confederate Memorial Weekend at Beauvoir and a full day of events on Saturday April 22, 2017 including drill and the Memorial. We have also participated in the Surrender Oaks Festival in Citronelle, AL. on May 6, 2017 where Gen Taylor's Troops were paroled and had a good weekend at Fort Gaines for Thunder on the Bay on May 21, 2017. We were able to garrison inside the Fort along with our pards the 7 Stars Artillery. On June 3, 2017, the 3rd Miss formed up at Beauvoir for the Pres. Davis 209th Birthday Celebration. On June 10th, members formed up as the Division Color Guard in Oxford to post colors. On June 16-17, 2017, the 3rd Miss Inf participated out at Ship Island for a very special weekend of events. The unit has formed up in July & August at Beauvoir's 3'd Saturday Living History and helped out at Fort Morgan's Commemorative Day Aug. 5, 2017. The 31st Annual Fall Muster the 3rd Miss Infreturned to the event with a spectacular weekend. It was truly an honor to represent our unit there. Next, the 3rd Miss Inf to participated in the Ladner Memorial down in Lakeshore where many Ladner descendants attended. After that we formed up at historic Camp Moore where the 3rd Miss Inf drilled, trained,and was reorganized in May of 1862. Color Bearer Oran Thomas has made the unit a beautiful regimental flag shown in many of our photos and that flag was presented to the company at Camp Moore. Lastly, we participated in the snowy weekend at McLoud's Mill in Leakesville where we marched in a parade, commemorated a memorial at the courthouse, and reenacted the battle on the banks of the Leaf River in 4 inches of snow at 30 something degrees. We have started a Facebook page to communicate with one another and pass along dates and information. The latest news on the 3rd Mississippi is that Co. K has formed from the central part of the state under the command of the Regiment, Co. F is now a member of the Gulf Coast Battalion of Reenactors and I was officially elected Captain. Future Presentation - Jim Huffman; "The Camel Regiment: A History of the Bloody 43rd MS Infantry, CSA."



The 43rd Mississippi Infantry of the Confederate States of America is the only regiment to have used a camel militarily east of the Mississippi.

Referred to as the Camel Regiment, it was organized in 1862 and surrendered in 1865. Using a variety of resources, the author provides a roster of the regiment along with detailed information on the formation, battles, and controversies surrounding the men. From the acquisition of the African dromedary Old Douglas to carry baggage and musical instruments through his death at Vicksburg and the fate of his fellow soldiers, Bell provides an entertaining historical narrative of this little-known chapter in American history.

Initiative Measure No. 62 proposes to amend the Mississippi Constitution to establish the 1894 flag as the ONE Official State Flag for the State of Mississippi, and require that the flag be flown at the principal installations of all State supported institutions, State agencies and political subdivisions.

Memphis Statue Removal

21 December 2017

SUBJECT: LAST NIGHT'S EVENTS IN THE CITY OF MEMPHIS

December 20th and 21st were extremely sad and disgraceful days for the City of Memphis, our State, and our Republic.

For civilized people throughout the world and for all Tennesseans that believe in the rule of law, the acts of the Memphis City Council should be recognized as being abhorrent and diametrically opposed to a government of the people. The Memphis City Council violated our system of laws, due process, and respect for the law.

The Sons of Confederate Veterans has fought efforts to destroy history, and specifically fought for four or five years to prevent the Memphis City Council from removing the Forrest Monument, headstones, and graves. In the courts and through administrative proceedings, the SCV has successfully defended the wrongful and bad intent of the Memphis City Council.

Specifically, this past October, in Athens, Tennessee, the Tennessee Historical Commission voted 18 to 6 to deny Memphis's petition to move the Forrest Statue and Monument. The SCV was present and was instrumental in having the City Council's actions denied.

In legal and administrative proceedings, Memphis admitted that the Tennessee Historical Commission had jurisdiction over the Forrest Statue. Still, in defiance of the law and legal procedures, they coordinated and sanctioned removal of the Forrest Monument.

It has been reported to the SCV that the Tennessee Attorney General repeatedly confirmed that the Forrest Statue and Monuments were being watched and safeguarded against illegal action. The Monument, and grave site, was to be protected until and unless legal proceedings resulted in alternative courses of action. Such was not the result last night.


Under the cloak of darkness and in defiance of our State's legal system, Memphis's claim that "We sold the parks to a 3rd party" is under the law, a sham, a deceit, and a subterfuge. It has been reported that Memphis sold the parks for \$1,000.00. Any such action would be shameful and would serve as the Memphis City Council's mockery of both our Judicial system and the Tennessee General Assembly.

Legal action by the State of Tennessee should be taken against the Memphis City Council. All residents of Tennessee are encouraged to request legal proceedings against the City by the State of Tennessee, and against anyone responsible for altering, moving, or disturbing the Forrest Statue, monument, or graves.

The Sons of Confederate Veterans, especially those members in the Memphis area, have valiantly defended the sanctity of the Forrest Monument, Statue, and graves. The Sons of Confederate Veterans and the legal team fighting to protect State history via the rule of law and through the legal bounds of the Courts and Administrative offices are to be highly commended. Such successful legal action stymied the ISIS-like action of the Memphis City Council, until lawlessness stole the night.

The Sons of Confederate Veterans will continue to uphold the law, and will continue to fight against injustice, such as the events in Memphis, Tennessee, on December 21, 2017.

Raid on Holly Springs


On December 20, 1862, Confederate General Earl Van Dorn thwarts Union General Ulysses S. Grant's first attempt to capture Vicksburg, Mississippi, when Van Dorn attacks Grant's supplies at Holly Springs, Mississippi.

Grant planned a two-pronged attack on the last Confederate stronghold on the Mississippi River. He would take a force from western Tennessee to approach Vicksburg from the interior of Mississippi. Meanwhile, Union General William T. Sherman would lead an army down the Mississippi River for an attack from the north. Grant said, "We can go as far as supplies can go."

The plan started on a good note for the Yankees when Grant's army pushed aside Confederates in northern Mississippi. In response, Confederate cavalry colonel John Griffith suggested attacking Grant's supply line at Holly Springs, and recommended Van Dorn for the mission. Up to that point, Van Dorn had done little to build his reputation. He lost the Battle of Pea Ridge in Arkansas and the Battle of Corinth, Mississippi, earlier in 1862, and was known for his drunkenness and tendency to cavort with prostitutes.

Van Dorn gathered three cavalry brigades and left Grenada, Mississippi, on December 17. On December 20, his forces fell on the Union supply depot at Holly Springs, driving the Yankee defenders away and capturing materials. What could not be carried was destroyed. Van Dorn remained in the area a few more days, cutting rail and telegraph lines, before fleeing in the face of pursuing Union cavalry. The Confederates rode 500 miles in two weeks, returning on December 28 after successfully disrupting Grant's campaign. The raid was the highlight of Van Dorn's military career. He was murdered five months later by the husband of a woman with whom he was having an affair.



Angel of Marye's Heights Story

Angel of Marye's Heights
Sgt. Richard Kirkland, Fredericksburg, Va., Dec. 14, 1862
Artwork and Comments by Mort Kunstler

He believed he had to help. Sergeant Richard Rowland Kirkland looked out on the field of battle at Fredericksburg, Virginia and was appalled at what he saw. The day before, he and other Southern troops in General Robert E. Lee's Army of Northern Virginia had turned back the Federal Army of the Potomac in one of the bloodiest battles of the Civil War. Wave after wave of courageous Northern troops had charged up Marye's Heights at Fredericksburg into the deadly massed fire of Confederate forces entrenched behind a fortified stone wall. The slaughter had been horrendous, and had left a carpet of blue-uniformed dead and wounded on the frozen slope of Marye's Heights. All night Kirkland and the other Southern defenders had listened to the heart-rending cries of the Federal wounded.

Finally, Kirkland could stand it no longer. At daylight on December 14th, the young sergeant in the 2nd South Carolina Infantry, requested permission to aid the enemy. His commanding officer was reluctant: Kirkland would likely be shot dead by Federal sharpshooters as soon as he showed himself above the wall. Kirkland was determined, however, and he was allowed to go – but he could not carry a flag of truce or a weapon. The youth borrowed an armload of canteens from his fellow soldiers, and climbed over the wall onto the field of dead and wounded.

While the other Confederates braced themselves for the rifle shot that would fell Kirkland, the young sergeant calmly walked to the closest wounded Northerner. The opposing Federal troops held their fire long enough for Kirkland to kneel down, lift up the wounded man's head and give him a drink of water. A loud cheer arose and rolled down the Federal line. Silently, the astounded line of Northern troops watched Kirkland move to another wounded man in blue and give him aid. Both sides held their fire while the courageous sergeant moved from one suffering soldier to another. Going back and forth over the wall for an hour and a half, Kirkland had done all he could do, and he returned safely to the Confederate line behind the wall.

It was an extraordinary event in an extraordinary war, and served as a heartfelt reminder that these enemies in blue and gray – Southerners and Northerners facing each other on the field of battle – were Americans all.

Mort Künstler's Comments

To me, the most compassionate and heroic act that occurred in the Civil War was Sergeant Richard Kirkland's action at the battle of Fredericksburg. I've wanted to paint the scene for years, and I thought a lot about how to do it best. First, the historic event had to be depicted accurately and authentically. That required – as do all my paintings – a tremendous amount of research. What time of day did this remarkable action take place? What were the weather conditions? How did the field of battle appear? How were the fallen Federal troops equipped? What kind of winter uniforms would each side have worn? How were Northern canteens different from Confederate canteens? As usual,

countless questions have to be answered in order for the painting to authentically reflect the historical event. For instance, behind the wall fly the flags of Kershaw's Brigade – in which Kirkland served – the appropriate Confederate battle flag, the South Carolina state flag and the Confederate "First National Flag" used at Fredericksburg.

Once the historic details were known and implemented in the painting, how could I strategically use artistic elements to effectively convey the power and emotion of this very moving and courageous act? I utilized the early morning sunlight hitting remnants of the snow to focus the viewer's eye on this compassionate Southern Samaritan. Another important point of composition is how the painting features the wounded Northern soldiers reaching out for water. I used the perspective lines of the stone wall converging at the right of the picture to silhouette the hand reaching out for water — and I used the early morning fog to lighten the area behind the hand. The sunlight spreading down the stone wall illustrates the time of day and the weather conditions, but it also allowed me to dramatically position the central focus on the courageous Kirkland, who less than a year later was killed at the battle of Chickamauga.

Our American Civil War was such a terrible, terrible tragedy, and yet it was replete with countless expressions of American courage, sacrifice and compassion like that of Richard Kirkland – who became famous as the "Angel of Marye's Heights."
