



## THE PETITION

Initiative Measure No. 62 proposes to amend the Mississippi Constitution to establish the 1894 flag as the ONE Official State Flag for the State of Mississippi, and require that the flag be flown at the principal installations of all State supported institutions, State agencies and political subdivisions.

## January 1861 Timeline & Secessions

<u>January 1, 1861</u>	On New Year's Day Georgians go to the polls to elect either a pro- Union or pro-Seccession slate of delegates to a state convention to be held in Milledgeville. According to Gov. Brown the results are overwhelmingly pro-secession, however, later research by the Georgia Historical Society indicates that the returns were overstated in favor of the secessionists.	<u>Georgia</u>
<u>January 1</u> , <u>1861</u>	A pro-Union meeting in Parkersburg (now West Virginia) resolves that "secession is revolution."	<u>West</u> Virginia
